Course Description:

This field experience course is designed to give students the opportunity to participate in a practicum teaching experience in another country. This particular practicum is scheduled for Jamaica. Students will be required to attend the required meetings during the evening to prepare for the trip to Jamaica. Students will also have the opportunity to be involved with at least one fund raiser to help raise funds to support their trip to Jamaica. Students will be introduced to the culture, economics, history, geography, politics and education of Jamaica through selected readings, presentations, seminars and by experiencing practicum teaching in Jamaica. The students will also have the opportunity to experience the culture of Mandeville and Negril. This course is intended for students in the School of Education and Professional Studies who have been admitted to the teacher education program at Shepherd University (completed Juncture I). In addition students are to have successfully completed EDUC 351 or EDUC 370 and have at least a 2.75 grade point average.

There will be at least three seminar meetings held during January to March to prepare for Jamaica prior to our departure. This does not include the major fundraising event "Jamaica Dinner".
